



VETERANS

Men's Standard Dress Uniform

Dress Shirt: Solid white, short or long sleeved, collared without buttons.

Dress Trousers: Solid black, cuffed or uncuffed.

Dress Belt: Solid black leather with silver or gold finished buckle.

Tie: Solid blue or black organizational tie, embroidered with CWV Celtic Cross emblem.

Gold for National Officers.

Dress Shoes: Solid black leather. Dress Socks: Solid black, calf-height.

Dress Blazer: Two button, single breasted Navy Blue with CWV custom buttons and slip badge on left pocket.

Awards/Medals: All CWV award medals worn will be full-sized. U.S. awards only may be full or miniature.

Men's Standard Business Uniform:

Collared Polo Shirt, with or without pockets (Madonna/Royal/Navy Blue, Red, White or Gold.)

Polo Shirt with pocket: embroidered emblem on the right side; without pocket, emblem on the left.

Dress Trousers: Solid Khaki/Tan, cuffed or uncuffed. Dress belt: solid black or tan leather, with buckle.

Dress Shoes: Black or tan leather. Dress Socks: Black or tan, calf-height.

Optional: Tie may be either black or blue. If not worn, top button of the shirt will be left unbuttoned.

Men's Formal Dress Uniform:

Same as men's standard dress uniform, but replace tie with black bow tie. The Garrison cap is not worn.

Men's National Officer Formal Dress Uniform:

Replace the CWV Blazer with a White Formal Dinner Jacket, and Black Tuxedo Trousers. Medals will be full-sized.

AUXILIARY

Women's Formal Uniform:

The formal uniform is jewel neck white blouse, black slacks, blazer (jacket), black shoes (no high heels or sandals, must be closed toe and heel), prescribed shoes are permissible. Black socks or black hose; black handbag, small button or CWVA earrings, garrison cap. No necklaces are permitted. St. Agnes awardees should wear their St. Agnes medal proudly on every occasion.

Women's Casual Uniform:

The Female Casual Uniform is the same as above except that instead of the white blouse and blazer or jacket, a blue CWVA shirt is worn.

Male Casual Uniform:

The Male Casual Uniform is the same as above except that instead of a white tailored shirt, a blue CWVA shirt is worn.

PNC (1998-1999) MANNY TANGUMA PASSES AT AGE 79

Past National Commander Manuel Tanguma, Jr. has passed away peacefully in Mission, Texas. His life was a testament to the enduring power of family, having been married to beloved wife Elvia for 57 years. He was a devoted husband, father of son Manuel (Kim) Tanguma III, and daughter Roxanna, and grandfather to six who were the heartbeat of his existence.

He was a proud Veteran of the U.S. Air Force. As a Military Police Sergeant he stood on the front lines during the Vietnam War. After his honorable discharge, he continued his service to his country in the Texas Army National Guard for an additional 21 years.

Manny was a member of the Catholic War Veterans Post in Mission, Texas where he achieved the historic milestone of becoming the first Hispanic Commander of a national veterans organization. On November 11, 1998, President Clinton extended a prestigious invitation to Manuel to deliver the Veterans Day speech at Arlington National Cemetery.

Commander Tanguma enjoyed the art of dance, had a passion for fishing, and a love of sports. He will be interred in the State Veterans Cemetery in Mission, Texas. He is remembered for the love that bound him to his family, the honor that defined his military service, and the joy that filled his heart

TEXAS STATE AUXILIARY PRESIDENT MARIA PEREZ PASSES AT AGE 81

Maria H. Perez, a devoted community leader, dedicated her life to serving others. A member of the San Jose Post 1805, she served in various offices in the Catholic War Veterans up through the Auxiliary National Board of Officers from 2005-2024. She served as President of the Department of Texas Auxiliary from 2005-2009 and 2019-2024.

Maria was preceded in death by her husband, Jose R. Perez and grandson Joel Basilio Borjas. She is survived by six children, fifteen grandchildren, nineteen great grandchildren, and three great-great grandchildren. Her family was the center of her world.

In 2019, she was inducted into the Order of St. Agnes by the CWVA organization for her humanitarian and undaunted service to God, Country and Home. Maria also volunteered her time and served as Chaplain of the local Elks Lodge. A devout Catholic and faithful servant of the Church, Maria found solace and joy in her faith. Her devotion to God and her community exemplified the true meaning of compassion and grace.

May her memory be a blessing to all who had the privilege of knowing her. She will be remembered fondly.




Veteran Organizations Demonstrate"In Unity There is Strength"



Our National Membership Officer is happy with your Post's efforts to reach out to former members and even more delighted that you have brought delinquent members back into Good Standing! Recruiting and Retaining Post members is everyone's responsibility – the job does not fall solely on the shoulders of your Post and Department Membership Officers. A Post whose members support or participate in any of our National Programs, especially Veterans Welfare and Youth activity, or Catholic Action and Americanism should all be 'recruiting' and inviting new Catholic Veterans to help with our mission "For God, For Country and For Home". On behalf of the National Membership Officer, Thank You, and everyone who is helping to increase Veteran Membership. Now to answer your question!



Step 1: Click the **Delinquent Members** menu as shown in the image on the left. Then click 'Edit' on the row where the re-affiliated member's name is listed.



For now, ONLY CHANGE the Member TYPE from Delinquent to **Regular Renewal**. Use the little drop-down arrow on the right side of the Member Type field to change it.



Step 2: Find and click the '<u>Update</u>' prompt in the bottom right corner to complete the change. The Delinquent Member should no longer appear on the Delinquent List. With a Member TYPE of Regular Renewal the member should appear on the Manage CWV Membership List. It is at this point you can review and update all of the data for this re-affiliated member so it is current.

Please remember to update the secondary database fields by clicking that little arrow in circle to the left of the member's name as described in the previous issue of the Catholic War Veteran magazine.

For those who have read up to this point, due to unforeseen circumstances, I have been appointed to serve as the National 2nd Vice Commander. This is why my article included comments about the importance of retaining and recruiting members.

Increasing the numbers of our Veteran membership is the focus of National Commander Wulf. Membership is the foundation of our organization, and we really need to strive to reestablish a Post in every state like we used to have back in the early years after WWI and WWII. Holy Thursday Brings A Sad Chapter!

The Queens County Chapter of the CWV presented Msgr. Fernando Ferrarese, Pastor of CWV's home parish of Immaculate Conception in Astoria, Queens, with a vestment and cope in memory of all living and deceased members. It was used for the first time at the Holy Thursday Mass. Ironically, the vestments would be used in memory of Shawn Crum, a member of Post 1, and the Nephew of Past National Commander Dave Crum. He died of cancer that same day at age 38, after a long illness.

WHAT'S IN A NAME? POST CARRIES NAME OF HISTORIC CIVIL WAR PRIEST

Thanx and a Tip of the Hat to Jack Benchik!

The charter members chose, as the name for their CWV Post 1842 at the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana, Father William Corby, C.S.C. a Catholic Chaplain from Indiana who ministered to troops at the Battle of Gettysburg. The Army of the Potomac's "Irish Brigade," including New York's "Fighting 69th," had already been decimated at the Battle of Fredericksburg in Virginia.

Hearing gunfire on their flanks, General Winfield Scott Hancock ordered the brigade forward. As the troops assembled, Fr. Corby knew many wanted their confessions heard, knowing they might soon be dead. Improvising, he borrowed an old Church custom from previous European wars, "general absolution." He climbed atop a large boulder and the soldiers—Catholic and Protestant—knelt in the grass around him and removed their caps. Fr. Corby donned a purple stole and told the men to silently recall their sins, ask for God's forgiveness, and recite the Act of Contrition.

And in unison, the 500-plus voices responded, "Amen." Father Corby is the only

FIRST KNOWN USE OF "OMG" WAS IN A LETTER TO WINSTON CHURCHILL DURING WORLD WAR I

Winston Churchill's remarkable life was filled with genuine "OMG" moments, from withstanding the disastrous Gallipoli campaign during the First World War to leading Britain through World War II as Prime Minister. Churchill held a front-row seat to many history-defining events

The expression "OMG," an acronym for "oh my god!" became popular as early internet lingo during the 1990s. But the first known use of the acronym dates back to a letter written to Churchill in 1917, while he was serving as First Lord of the Admiralty in the British Navy.

The letter was written by John Arbuthnot Fisher, who, as First Sea Lord (the Navy's highest ranking officer, often quarreled with Churchill. In the 1917 missive, Fisher wrote: "I hear that a new order of Knighthood is on the table. O.M.G. (Oh! My God!) shower it on the Admiralty!

Sadly for the linguistically-hip Fisher, neither the navy, nor the British people adopted his clever quip. It wasn't until after the arrival of the internet age some 70 years later that the "OMG" acronym exploded in popularity.



Last USS ARIZONA Survivor Passes At Age 102

The tough final survivor, Louis "Lou" Conter, age 102, was on deck when the USS ARIZONA was sunk by the Japanese in the surprise attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941. The 1,177 men on board accounted for nearly half of the Americans lost that day. The resident of Grass Valley, California was still doing interviews at 100 years of age. Just 20 years old, he was the Quartermaster on watch at 7:55 AM, when the first plane came across. "As soon as they came in, we knew what was happening, we knew for six months we were training hard for fighting the Japanese at war."

"They were dive bombing and were right down the ship's edge. A hundred-pound bomb went through five decks and the whole bow came up out of the water. Another bomb blasted through the steel decks and ignited more than a million pounds of gunpower stored below. That one propelled the battleship about 40 feet in the air and set it on fire," Conter said in an oral history interview stored at the Library of Congress. He and other sailors began helping the injured men, many blinded and badly burned, trying to prevent them from jumping overboard as oil in the water was burning.

After 40 minutes, a total of 19 ships and 188 planes of the Pacific Fleet were lost. Altogether, 2,403 Americans died and 640 were never accounted for. More than 1,100 were wounded. On the ARIZONA, most were killed at their battle stations. Afterward, Conter went to flight school and flew 200 combat missions. In 1943, he and his crew were shot down in shark-filled waters near New Guinea. They treaded water until another plane came along and dropped them a lifeboat. He would later use the lessons he learned from his near-death experiences to become the Navy's first SERE (Survival, Evasion, Resistance and Escape) officer in the late 1950's. He retired as a Lieutenant Commander.

U.S. Navy Names Next-Generation Hospital Ship

Secretary of the Navy Carlos Del Toro announced the new name for the Navy's next-generation hospital ships, to be known as Expeditionary Medical Ship (EMS). The lead ship in the new class will be named USNS BETHESDA (EMS 1), honoring the history and community of healthcare professionals at Naval Support Activity Bethesda, MD. The new ships will



feature a shallow draft, enabling them to reach shallow austere ports directly, and a flight deck accommodating military helicopters.

They will offer a wide range of medical capabilities, including triage and critical care facilities, three operating rooms, a medical laboratory, blood bank, dental services, mental health support, OB/GYN and primary care, rapid stabilization and evacuation of multiple casualties as well as search and rescue operations including recovery at sea. EMS ships are capable of speeds of 30 knots, covering a range of 5,500 nautical miles. This first-in-class ship will be state-of-the-art and the Navy's first hospital ships in 35 years, eventually replacing USNS MERCY and USNS COMFORT.

A LITTLE BIT OF HISTORY ABOUT THIS FAMOUS POSTER

The origins of Uncle Sam can be traced back to the War of 1812, where he emerged as a personification of the U.S. Government. Prior to this, other symbols, such as Columbia and Lady Liberty were used.

Samuel Wilson a meat packer who supplied barrels of beef to the U.S. Army, is often credited as the inspiration behind the name. The barrels were marked with "U.S." for United States, but soldiers began joking that the initials stood for "Uncle Sam" Wilson., The local newspaper picked up on the story, and the nickname soon spread.

Over time, Uncle Sam's image started to take on a more defined form, largely due to the efforts of political cartoonists. One of the most influential was Thomas Nast, who played a significant role in creating the visual representation of Uncle Sam. His



illustrations gradually shaped him into a recognizable national symbol. He was portrayed as a stern but benevolent figure, dressed in the stars and stripes of the flag.

This laid the groundwork for James Montgomery Flagg's famous World War I era recruiting poster, with Uncle Sam pointing directly at the viewer with a determined expression and the caption "I Want YOU for U.S. Army". It is now part of the American culture, symbolizing a call to duty and patriotism.

"ROSIE THE RIVETERS" HONORED WITH CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL!

Two dozen surviving Rosie the Riveters were honored with the Congressional Gold Medal in a recent ceremony at the White House. After the United States entered World War II, men who joined the military left behind millions of jobs that needed to be filled, especially in factories that supported the war effort.
